Keep up with your school's community. Provide your readers with rich and relevant content.

YOU'VE HEARD IT TIME AND AGAIN: A BLOG IMPROVES YOUR SCHOOL'S SEARCH ENGINE OPTIMIZATION (SEO).

But seriously? Who has time for that?

I know because I've been there. It takes everyone you've got and all you've got just to get the basics accomplished. (Drowning in paperwork, anyone?) I mean there are tuition checks to gather then deposit; forms to develop, disperse, receive, and document; taxes to submit; payroll to distribute; emails to send and respond to; and the list could go on and on forever.

And that's not even to mention the actual teaching at your school...because let's be real, you're probably doing that too.

So it's completely laughable when someone recommends starting and maintaining a blog for your school in addition to all of the work required to keep your school legal and in operation.

Buuuuuuuuuuuuuut.....

What if I told you it matters? What if I told you that it not only helps you build your online community but can also lead to:

- More shared links
- · Bringing a community along with you to share ideas
- Communicating clearly to:
 - Current families
 - Potential families
 - Past families
 - The communities of your families
- Higher ranking on Google (read: easier to find) because of
 - Constantly updating information
 - Use of keywords that show up in searches
 - More interaction with guests to the website
 - Blogs indicate an active online presence rather than a stagnant one
- Builds your school's credibility
- Educating, entertaining, and engaging your audien

Now, who wouldn't want all that?

But still stuck on that first part where we wallowed in all that it already takes to run a school? I gotcha.

That's why I'm here with some starters to get you going. In fact, if you plan to post about once per week (recommended), this could get you through an entire school year!

Now, I can't write your blog for you (actually, <u>I can</u>, <u>and I'm super passionate about doing</u> <u>just that...check it out...</u>), I <u>can</u> provide you with topics, titles, subtitles, and a few notes I've picked up along the way. This should help you get off to a great start. After all, this is a blog. Which means if you're in the industry (and you are), you already have most of the information you need to write the post...right in your head.

A note or two about this super handy tool:

- 1. This is written to the benefit of independent, non-traditional schools. A lot of the posts focus on highlighting your school's distinct philosophy and uniqueness. If you are an educationally-based business but not a school, some modifications will need to be made.
- 2. While these are great writing prompts and starting points, there will obviously be work needed for the actual content.
- 3. Anywhere there is a blank is meant for you to fill out your school/business or your philosophy. Read a little and use common sense to figure out which one best applies.

- 4. Any titles using "10" are just to get you thinking. If you can come up with only 7, use that. It's the list-type title that gets the clicks. Vary the number. Sometimes 3 is a lot more manageable and click-inviting than 10.
- 5. David Ogilvy (known as the "Father of Advertising") said, "On the average, five times as many people will read the headline as read the body copy." So, while these aren't canned blog posts you can just copy and paste to your school's site, these headlines have been designed (by yours truly) to maximize clicks and convince your audience to give it a look. The content you provide will be what gets them to read all the way through (which is the important part).
- 6. Scannability matters as much as the quality content throughout. The Headings are mini-titles (bolded and usually centered) throughout each post. This will give your post organization and structure as well as allow readers an easy way to gauge if they want to read carefully. Use these to draw readers' attention. These suggestions can also help you brainstorm and push through writer's block. (The list-based posts don't include heading ideas because each item on your numbered list will serve this purpose.)
- 7. If this feels important but overwhelming, you're right. Content writing for your school is all about the long-term approach. This is often something that gets shoved to the back burner...for years. Give it a shot. Or, reach out. This is my jam. I have been there. I know the struggles. I realize the importance. It's why I started content writing for schools just like yours. I want to help you get the word out. All you have to do is click.
